



DU Initiates Career Development Program To Feature Alumni Mentoring and Networking

On February 24, 2000, Bruce Tracey, our faculty adviser par excellence, launched Delta Upsilon's Career Development Program. Seventeen brothers and one sorority guest participated in the inaugural two-hour session at the house. Everyone responded with enthusiasm; the possibilities are clearly unlimited.

Millie Reed, the director of Career Services & Employer Relations from the hotel school, led the session. She expertly covered all of the basics—resumes, cover letters, personal marketing plans, interviewing, and Cornell resources available. (Millie revealed that this was the first time she had ever been invited to a fraternity at Cornell. She clearly savored the experience and was as captivated by our brothers as they were by her).

At the session we had a mix of pledges, sophomores, juniors, and seniors. We learned that summer jobs and internships are just as important to undergraduates as are jobs for seniors in the outside world.

The diversity of the skills, accomplishments, and career goals of our brothers is impressive—ranging from golf course design to Internet graphics creation, marketing, biology,

engineering, hotel management, financial services, and many others.

Basic job search skills training and other resources are readily available in each of Cornell's seven major colleges and at the university career center, so we don't need to duplicate them. However, alumni support available through Cornell, while of high quality, is limited, and often it is not personalized to an individual student's needs.

Our opportunity as DU alumni is to launch something really special in terms of alumni/undergraduate relations at Cornell. While informal networking is commonplace within the Greek community, no chapter has implemented a proactive approach or mobilized the power and talent of its alumni. We can invent the model and make a difference that will have a permanent impact at Cornell and that will make us all proud to be DU brothers.

Here is what we need from DU alumni:

- Five to 10 alumni to form our advisory committee.
- Twenty career mentors.
- One hundred people to serve as information and networking sources.

Young alumni will be a critical element to this program's success. We need good participation from brothers from different eras and from different career backgrounds.

This is your opportunity to do something unique for DU and Cornell. Sharing your success with our undergraduate brothers will be gratifying to you and enormously appreciated by them.

Please volunteer. We guarantee that we will respect your time constraints and privacy. For career mentors, we will implement a self-selection process to be controlled by the alumni steering committee. For those who are willing to serve as an information or networking source, your primary contribution will be your knowledge, experience, and insight. We will not publish your name directly to the undergraduates. All contacts with you will be screened by alumni who will qualify the request and confirm your availability.

This is an opportunity to give back to DU and Cornell and to help an exceptional group of young men to get their careers moving in the right direction. You will find this a rewarding experience and a chance to connect with a great team of people in a worthwhile cause. You will gain insight into the current generation of brothers at DU and have a lot of fun in the process.

I think that this resource will be of great benefit and use to all of the members of Delta Upsilon. I look forward to being able to provide this tool to the entire Delta Upsilon family.


