DU Brothers Meet With The Architects

Recently, architects from Holt Engineering and Cornell University sat down with brothers to discuss the possibilities of renovating and improving the DU house. The session, run by senior engineer Graham Gillespie of Holt, was very enlightening and produced many good ideas. The following highlights some of the more interesting ideas discussed during the meeting.

The multipurpose room in the basement is currently not being utilized very effectively. Brothers commented that the room was visually cold and disconnected from the warm and friendly atmosphere of the rest of the house. Various ideas for improvements to this facility were discussed, including paneling the walls, changing the lighting, adding a large fireplace, reinstalling the south tower circular staircase, and even moving the dining room to the multipurpose room.

This latter idea would better connect the kitchen and the dining facility and would open up the existing dining room for use as a pool table/game room. This in turn would allow the library to be set up as a functional study space with high-speed Internet access computer terminals and space for individual or

group study.

Bathrooms. The bathrooms at the house have definitely seen brighter days. In recent years, the plumbing has been a continuous problem and caused the house to incur additional maintenance expenses. If there is work to be done on the house in the future, renovating the bathrooms is the one thing that all of the brothers agree must be done.

Adding a ladies' room on the first floor is also a priority. Most of the other ideas concerned heating, windows, lighting, power outlets, telephone and computer lines, door locks, trash handling, and a long list of cosmetic concerns. We look forward to seeing the recommendations of the study and working actively with alumni toward their implementation.

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

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DU Reinstates Formal Initiation Of New Men

Beginning in the spring of 2001 the Cornell Chapter of Delta Upsilon will reinstitute the practice of formal initiation of new brothers. We will follow the initiation ritual outlined by Delta Upsilon International. Founded on principles of non-secrecy, Delta Upsilon invites parents, relatives, and alumni to take part in the new ceremony.

The initiation ritual comprises two parts called Rites. In Rite I, the incoming pledge class makes declarations regarding character. They are then informed of the nature of the pledges to follow in the main part of the initiation, and they indicate their willingness to accept those pledges.

Finally, they sign the Roll Book and are qualified to proceed to Rite II. In Rite II, candidates take the initiation pledges, are invested with the fraternity insignia, and are formally inducted as members.

The purpose of this initiation ritual is twofold. First, it serves as an example of our principle of non-secrecy. All family members and relatives are invited to take part in the most sacred part of a candidate's pledge process. Second, it serves to continue a tradition that dates back to when this fraternity was founded. It is our hope that the ritual will become an occasion to reminisce about.
