Chapter Makes Noteworthy Efforts In Philanthropy, Academics, Rush

For all DUs and their families, the brothers of 6 South send our deepest condolences to those who lost someone dear to them in the events of September 11. Thankfully, none of the undergraduate brothers lost family members, but many of their parents and family friends did suffer such losses. Those who sacrificed their lives to save the lives of others have our deepest respect and admiration.

There has been an awakening of sorts, and its effects are being felt at Cornell and Ithaca. The complacency that Americans felt prior to September 11 had been evident at DU; brothers were comfortable with their lives and did not often think about the roles they play as citizens of a larger community. This is no longer the case. We as a house are making a conscientious effort to change parts of our lives and to make Cornell and Ithaca better places. For instance, DU recently donated over \$1,000 to the Ithaca Youth Bureau to support the needy children in the area. These children are part of the One-to-One Program, which is very similar to the Big Brother Program offered by the YMCA. We donated another \$1,000 to the Families of Fire Fighters Fund. I do not know a person who would not like to have the heroism and selflessness of the fire fighters lost in New York. Nothing will bring back the husbands and fathers who were lost, but perhaps our small contribution will help to bring healing to some of those families.

On a brighter note, we are working to strengthen the fraternity in several areas, most notably academics. Our academic chair, Paul Kaufman, is working hand-in-hand with our academic adviser, Dr. J. Bruce Tracey, to develop an academic program to suit the needs of our brothers. The

recent revival of scholarship awards really sent a message to the brothers, and academic achievement is becoming a focus of the executive board.

Fall rush has been going well, and the efforts of the fall semester have been paying off. Many freshmen have been attending our events and spending time with the brothers. Much credit must be given to our rush chairs—John Buttermore, Nate Spittler, Ricky Rahne, and Pete Iverson—for all of their hard work and for the great

pledge class that seems to be taking shape.

This is my last letter as president of DU, so I would like to thank all of those who have given me this opportunity to become a better brother and a better man. Without the help of all the brothers I've lived with, I am not sure that my presidency would have been as successful. Never before had I met a bunch of guys who can tackle a problem from so many angles and help me to think "outside the box." As I make my way into the world with the rest of the class of '02, I will take with me a small piece of everyone here.

Finally, on behalf of the entire house, I'd like to thank Tony Murray and his dedicated alumni board. Tony has been a great asset to this house, and I hope he continues to make the undergraduates a part of his daily life. Tony's leadership and advisory style are proving to be a perfect fit for this house, and his first year as president of the alumni board should be commended.

I wish the best of luck to the graduating class and to our fellow undergraduates. Although we may travel far and wide, in our hearts we'll never be far from DU.

House Treasury's In Great Shape

For instance, in the spring semester of last year, two brothers decided to relocate from the house to apartments in Ithaca. This was unfortunate for the house, because we were faced with the challenge of making up for a considerable loss of revenue.

At first it looked like we would have to cut our social budget significantly. We did not want to do this, and we also did not want to place an assessment on each brother. So Jon and I sat down with Barb, and we were able to make significant budget cuts in other areas. In fact, according to Barb, this was one of the first years that we ended up with a profit at the end of the year.

Furthermore, by working closely with Philanthropy Chair Bill Schuerman '03, we decided that we were going to raise more money for the Ithaca Youth Bureau

from the proceeds of our annual clambake T-shirts on Slope Day. As philanthropy chair last year, I was able to raise \$1,000, but this simply was not enough. We were beginning to become a leader on campus in philanthropic activities, and it was time to move into the upper echelon.

Bill was able to raise over \$2,000. Moreover, by increasing his budget, we gave him the freedom to partake in more activities. Jon and I decided that even if Bill went over budget, we would make cuts somewhere else, because philanthropy is a top priority in this house. In the wake of the tragic events of September 11, we decided to give \$1,000 to the Ithaca Youth Bureau and the remaining \$1,000 to a fund for the New York Fire Department.

As treasurer of Delta Upsilon, I am happy to say that we are stronger than ever financially. I also feel that once I step down as treasurer in December, the next treasurer will take us one step further. Kudos to the brotherhood for making these past two semesters great.

DU Brothers Find Many Ways To Give Back To The

Our service efforts began in mid-September, as the brothers of DU made significant donations to the Ithaca Youth Bureau and New York State Firefighter Relief Fund. The funds donated to the Youth Bureau were raised through the hard work of brothers this past spring. We raised over \$1,000 selling clambake T-shirts to students and friends for our annual spring fundraiser held on Slope Day. To raise money for the Firefighter Relief Fund, the brothers voted to reallocate funds from our social budget. The entire brotherhood felt one party was a small price to pay to help support such a worthy cause. Our efforts were recognized on September 25 by *The Cornell Daily Sun*, which published an article highlighting these donations and our

other community service efforts here at Cornell.

Earlier in the semester, we participated in Kappa Alpha Theta's Tip-A-Canoe race at Beebe Lake, which raises money for the Ithaca Rape Crisis Center. All of the brothers had a great time racing canoes around Beebe Lake, as our two teams turned in some of the fastest times of the day.

This semester we have two projects planned with On-Site, a student agency that coordinates people and equipment to provide volunteer help in the community. The first project is a haunted house for the children of Ithaca. Last year, brothers from our house helped set up the haunted house and then dressed up as monsters to scare the kids. Our second On-Site effort will be a "pre-construction" project, which we'll tell you more about in the next *Noose*.

In-House Brothers Enjoy Expanded Internet Access

The Internet has become a vital component of class work here at the university. Teachers are now using electronic media to post assignments, announcements, and other general notes for their classes. At the end of last school year, the fraternity provided Internet access on only the two house computers. The two-computer setup was very inefficient, and lines of brothers waiting to use the computers were not uncommon. As a result, many brothers became so unhappy with the Internet situation that they bought their own service.

At the beginning of this year the first attempts were made to expand Internet access at DU. A few personal computers on the upper floors were added to the network using ethernet cards. We also put the house printer on the network to allow brothers to print from their own computers. This network configuration is working successfully and is leading to additional computers continually being added to the house network.

William Goodrich has designed a plan for the future, which entails an Internet hookup for each room in the house, giving all brothers Internet access, printer capabilities, and file-sharing ability from the comfort of their rooms. In addition, the computers in the study room will be made into a Web server so the house can have its own Web page. House Adviser Dr. Bruce Tracey is coordinating this technology.

Most of the equipment has already been purchased, and it is just a matter of time before all computers are wired together. With advances in technology, the house's Internet connection should be comparable to that of the university within the next two years. In addition to the obvious academic applications, the technological upgrade at the house will allow for improvements in rush, alumni relations, and a multitude of chapter administrative tasks. Our hats are off to William Goodrich, whose hard work is giving our brothers the technological advantage that dormitory life has come to provide.

Fall Rush Going Well Despite New Challenges

With all freshmen housed on North Campus this year, the DU brothers expected the fall rush effort to be more challenging than usual. We therefore put considerable thought, effort, and energy into our barbecues and other rush events—and so far we've had nothing but positive results. We expect the new class will be a strong and diverse one, and we look forward to introducing our newest members in the next issue of the newsletter.

One change this year that will help to promote academic responsibility among the new members will be scholarships awarded to the freshmen with the most improved grade point average. These scholarships have not been given in the past and are part of an effort to improve the house's academic standing. Our faculty adviser, Bruce Tracy, continues to be a valuable resource and mentor to any brother requesting assistance with his studies. His guidance is greatly appreciated.
