The traditional reception was held after the football game and beautifully catered by Pierce's 1894 Restaurant under the direction of Joe Pierce '75. The DU recolonization ceremony followed the reception. Most alumni and parents stayed for the ceremony, so the Great Hall was packed. The ceremony marked a momentous occasion in the 134-year history of the Delta Upsilon Fraternity at Cornell University. It was moving and inspiring.

The names of many attendees and our new DUs are included in this issue. We were fortunate that so many of our star DU football players from over the decades returned to Cornell to be recognized at half-time (all-Ivy and Cornell hall of fame members). With six varsity football players currently in DU and strong undergraduate

leaders in the chapter, we were blessed by the presence of several parents and family members.

Tony Murray '60 welcomed the guests and recognized key alumni and visitors. The recolonization ceremony was conducted by Tony, Fred Harwood '59, and Tony Cashen '57. Gage Stille '05 and Adam Star '04, DU brothers from Georgia Tech and Indiana, assisted along with two representatives from DU international headquarters. Tony Cashen delivered an eloquent and moving charge, which is printed in this issue of the *Noose* (page two). Tony was able to capture the essence of what is happening at DU and bring us all together with a unified vision for DU's future.

Our 25 new DUs (plus Gage and Adam) are now official members of the Cornell DU colony and will be initiated on December 6, 2003, when DU's charter is reinstated. They are currently going through a challenging

## Charge To New Members

*Recolonization ceremony charge delivered to new members  
by Tony Cashen '57*

This is the point in the recolonization ceremony where it is customary to deliver the so-called "charge"...the statement of purpose describing and inspiring new members about the relevance and importance of membership in Delta Upsilon.

However, this is not the ordinary charge, following the ordinary new member training program, following the ordinary recruitment process. This is the extraordinary charge, following the extraordinary new member training program, following the extraordinary recruitment process.

But, that's okay. As some of you have already heard me describe before, we are like a venture capital start-up...we are entrepreneurs visioning, investing in, and creating a new enterprise, a new fraternity based upon ideas and ideals that we share with one another and will use to create the new DU.

I use the word entrepreneur to describe what we are doing together. We alums had a vision of what a renewed DU could be. DU is a 134-year-old institution on the Cornell campus, established in 1869, four years after the founding of the university in 1865. Cornell DU was the 18th chapter to join DU after its founding in 1834 at Williams College as the first "nonsecret" fraternal society.

Our alumni vision for a new DU is partially based upon DU's founding principles: THE PROMOTION OF FRIENDSHIP; THE DEVELOPMENT OF CHARACTER; THE DIFFUSION OF LIBERAL CULTURE; and THE ADVANCEMENT OF JUSTICE.

But it has also been further shaped into a plan to reflect current ideals we want as part of our operating principles. Those new elements include a commitment to:

- No hazing whatsoever in our new member training;
- Diversity of membership in our brotherhood;
- Commitment to excellence in scholarship; and
- Programs in philanthropy, community service, and leadership.

Last April we described this vision to you, our 15 initial core founding new members. You in turn have described it this fall to additional new member prospects, and seven of them have become additional founding new members today.

In entrepreneurial terms, we, the alumni, are investors and partners in this new enterprise. You, as new members, are the management and partners in the new enterprise. Together, as owner/investors, we will share in the progress and benefits of this new enterprise.

Last week, I had the opportunity to attend the inauguration of Cornell's new president, Jeffrey Lehman. In his inaugural speech, he talked about a new beginning for Cornell. He also talked about two defining characteristics of Cornell and its history. He used the words REVOLUTIONARY and BELOVED in describing Cornell.

He talked about Cornell's founding as REVOLUTIONARY. It was in fact a revolution... the first truly American university... "a university where any student could find instruction in any study"... a very egalitarian characteristic and a contrast to other rather elitist early universities.

He also described Cornell as BELOVED. Beloved, because the diverse experiences provided Cornell students during their four years on campus enrich them in a way that affects them for the rest of their lives and leaves them with fond memories, making Cornell beloved.

Likewise, we are being REVOLUTIONARY in creating a new DU. And it will become BELOVED to all of us as we succeed in its creation.

I urge all of you to think about these ideals, purposes, and characteristics that will make us successful and different as a new DU... and as a REVOLUTIONARY new kind of fraternity at Cornell.

And, as we go forward, I guarantee you that you will look back on the close friendships you establish with your DU brothers and the enjoyment and fun you share with them... and your DU will, indeed, become BELOVED.

## Undergrads Work Hard To Recolonize DU

The semester started a little earlier than normal for us here at Delta Upsilon this fall. Amid numerous work projects and bonding activities, our group of 15 recolonizers gathered at the house before the start of classes to get the house up and running and also take part in an informal workshop on fraternity affairs run by several of the Cornell Chapter's esteemed alumni. The house was presented to us in magnificent condition with only a few odd jobs around to have it back to its full potential. We took part in vacuuming, dusting, painting, landscaping, and moving furniture all over the house to have it in the best condition possible to start the semester.

During meals and at night we listened intently to Tony Murray, Tony Cashen, Fred Harwood, and several others, trying to absorb all of the information we would have to know to handle the house on our own. We are still learning to this day as this is all new to most of us, but we are slowly but surely getting the hang of it. We set up an informal structure made up of several committees including chapter management, social activities, philanthropy, technology, and recruitment. We appointed a chair for each committee, with the group of chairs making up the executive house committee. This provided us with enough of a backbone of leadership to get us started and also allowed us to get to know each other before electing official officers.

While our recolonization ceremony on Homecoming Weekend seemed distant enough, we had to begin the difficult task of organizing a fall rush to bring more members into our core group. If you have had a chance to meet even a few of those members that we obtained over the last two months, I think you would agree with all of us here that it was a rousing success. Eleven new members decided to join Delta Upsilon, bringing our total up to 27 with spring rush on the way. Our mission to become one of the top fraternities here at Cornell has spread across campus, and the momentum is building as we speak.

At this point, we have ended our fall rush period and are now heading into our self-imposed new member program. We are forced to administer this to ourselves in a way, as only two men, Gage Stille and Adam Star, are truly DU brothers at the present time. They have taken the lead in organizing and administering the new member program and are doing an outstanding job. Events have and will include a night all together on the sleeping porch, new member Olympics in the downstairs all-purpose room, and a final weekend scavenger hunt before initiation on December 6, 2003. During the week we have been participating in DU history study sessions, which include study of *The Cornerstone* and tests from the previous week's material. To ensure that all of these events are taken seriously, an accountability system has been put in place with "strikes" being given for lateness, disruption, disrespect, etc. Should a member receive three "strikes" before initiation, he will be forced to wait until the spring to go through the new member program again and then potentially become a brother.

As you can see, there is a tremendous amount of action taking place at the house this semester as we get the ball rolling. The ball is picking up speed, and with every day that goes by here it seems to be moving faster and faster, with no insurmountable obstacles in its way.
