\$1.3M Capital Campaign Closes In On Half-Way Mark

Having spent the past 12 months on the leadership phase of the five-year chapter capital campaign, we are nearing our objective of reaching the half-way goal of \$650,000. The steering committee for the campaign will launch the all-member canvas for campaign participation and support once that goal has been achieved. They anticipate doing so in April 2005.

The objective of the all-member canvas will be to contact every chapter alumnus and encourage their participation in the campaign. With over 1,000 Cornell DU alums, the contact effort will be a far-reaching and challenging endeavor held over a two-year period. This phase of the solicitation will not only prove critical to the success of the campaign, but it will also provide the opportunity to renew connections between DUs, as well as provide an abundance of information about fellow classmates for reporting in the *Noose*.

Between now and next April, the campaign steering committee listed below will be completing contact with additional potential leadership contributors (those willing to pledge \$10,000 over a five year period) to help reach the half-way goal. The committee believes the campaign goal of \$1.3M will best be met when the half-way goal is

achieved. For reference, Chi Psi has just completed a \$2.5M campaign and Sigma Chi is concluding a \$2M renovation of their chapter. These, along with major capital plans laid for Phi Gam, Psi U, Sigma Phi, Delta Chi, DEKE, Delta Phi, Alpha Delt, and Beta, indicate the breadth of active alumni support for Cornell's Greek System.

Over the past 18 months, your alumni directors have accomplished a remarkable re-building of the undergraduate chapter as described in the president's newsletter and other articles in the *Noose*. Returning alumni have met the new undergraduate brothers and seen the extensive improvements and renovations completed in the chapter house. A successful conclusion of the capital campaign will ensure the future of DU on the Cornell campus in the 21st Century.

Alumni President Reports On Chapter Progress

Dear Brother:

My letter in last spring's *Noose* highlighted the key accomplishments and events that contributed to our DU chapter's success in its first year of operation. I also stressed that both active brothers and alumni must continue to identify and make needed improvements.

Both undergrads and alumni directors have spent considerable time and effort over the past six months addressing these improvements. We have also received constructive recommendations from Cornell's Office of Fraternity and Sorority Affairs (OFSA) and the DU International Fraternity. Just to give you a perspective, these efforts include: a May retreat with the chapter's officers and several alumni directors; chapter and alumni representation at the annual DU Leadership convention; the International's evaluation of our Chapter of Excellence submission for our first year; OFSA's review and evaluation of DU for 2003-2004 academic year; our first Cornell DU brotherhood retreat on August 29, which is discussed in this *Noose*; DU consultant's September 1-4 chapter visit and report, as well as on-going discussions, status calls; and e-mails between undergrads and alumni.

The bottom line is we are jointly working on:

- Establishing more effective chapter-wide organization including the addition of a VP of Membership Education and a VP for Loss Prevention.
- Establishing better communications within the chapter and with alumni directors so that the entire brotherhood is aware and involved, as appropriate, in issues and decisions.
- Establishing an internal structure for self-governance with judicial procedures and a judicial board.
- Ensuring stricter adherence to the university's and DU's social guidelines and policies.

- Implementing an effective academic and scholarship program.
- Enhancing our current new member education program.
- Establishing an on-going membership education program for brothers.

I believe the chapter and directors are making realistic progress in accomplishing these. We will keep you informed on our success.

Many thanks to Danny Alvarez '91 who organized another very successful and fun-filled spring dinner in New York City on April 22. After reading Danny's write-up in this *Noose*, why not plan ahead now and put April 21, 2005 on your calendar.

Also, once again, thanks to Bob Verna's efforts over 60 DU alums and family members attended our very enjoyable Saturday afternoon reception during reunions. Finally, Randy Shayler '07 and many other brothers have done a great job hosting tailgates and post game receptions at the house, most recently for Homecoming Weekend.

On behalf of all Cornell DUs, I want to thank and congratulate Greg Moore for his commitment, leadership, and contributions as the chapter president during our first year back on campus! Greg is continuing his involvement in DU and assisted our new president—Bart VanStekelenburg—with the transition. Bart has very ably served as our former treasurer and house manager. We welcome Bart as president and are working very closely with him, other house officers, and the entire brotherhood.

But we are asking for your help in two key areas—in recruitment and in our capital campaign.
