The long days of staring at a screen and watching online lectures, eating pickup meals in isolation on throwaway paper plates, and limiting social gatherings to ten people finally seem to be behind us.

In many ways, DU has been the best place to spend two years of college life during a pandemic. While the online classes and Cornell's restrictions and elimination of most campus activities was a difficult period, the brotherhood and built-in social life at DU helped fend off the isolation felt by many other students. The new weight room in the basement, access to a well-equipped and comfortable library, and the Great Hall filled with a group of lively young men made 6 South Ave. a great place to be during a pandemic.

6 South Ave. continues to be a great place to be as we slowly return to pre-pandemic life. In between classes, the house is filled with brothers. Restarting Traditions On Strong Foundation

After more than two years of COVID restrictions interrupting normal campus and fraternity life, DU has started the return to normal fraternity activities and to restart our best traditions. This includes activities like regular face-to-face chapter meetings, regular DU dining, including Sunday dinners, live E-board meetings, philanthropy events, and face-to-face new-member education and onboarding.

Despite restrictions on fall and early spring recruiting, the DU brothers delivered one of our largest and most diverse classes in years (see brief bios in this newsletter). For the full 2021–2022 academic year, we recruited 30 new members and expect to have a full house starting next fall. One special tradition restarted after a two-year hiatus was a formal initiation ceremony on March 12 for our spring new members, led by Chapter President Chase Collins. I had the pleasure of attending in person, along with alumni Bob Verna and Mark Clemente (via Zoom). It was great to see the house

“buzzing” with activity on an unusually warm March weekend and having the opportunity to meet face to face with new and current brothers.

Along with the entire Cornell community, we are excited to participate in live on-campus Reunion and Homecoming celebrations this year. Reunion weekend is currently scheduled for June 10–12. For those planning to attend Reunion, we will be hosting a DU reception for all years on Saturday June 11 from 4:00–6:00 pm, including appetizers, beverages, and some great company with exaggerated storytelling. I look forward to seeing a strong turnout of DU alumni: recent and fossils, including the 40th Reunion for the class of '82.

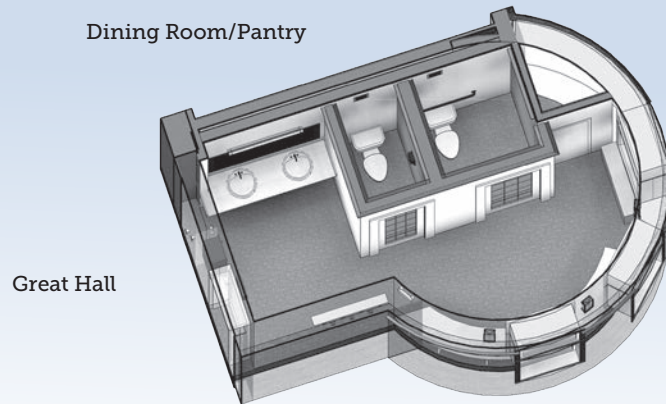

Turret Restroom Update



One year ago, we wrote to you about a new restroom planned just off the Great Hall. This unisex and ADA-compliant restroom would commandeer the southwest turret, where the spiral stair used to be. Cornell put the project out to bid and we had a decision to make in the second quarter of 2021. The low bid was higher than our architects had projected. That is not uncommon, given the excessive demand for construction projects at Cornell. That we remained in COVID-world did not help.

Cornell had earlier withdrawn \$35,000 from our DU gift account for this project. We assumed this transfer was a down payment for a restroom that we told Cornell we were committed to undertake. Indeed, we are required by Cornell (and federal law) to create a proper ADA restroom as part of our overall capital improvements. We soon

learned the \$35,000 was not a down payment but instead set aside for soft costs over and above the construction costs. We were close, but we did not actually have sufficient funds to satisfy Cornell's contracts office. We hit pause.

The rendering (above) is the same as shown to you in the last newsletter. Check out the architects' 3D renderings on the next page. We remain committed to building this much-needed amenity for DU. We hope to do so as soon as possible. It is only with your continued payment of pledges and potential new gifts that we can make this a reality. As always, we appreciate your support.

Chapter President — State of the House Update

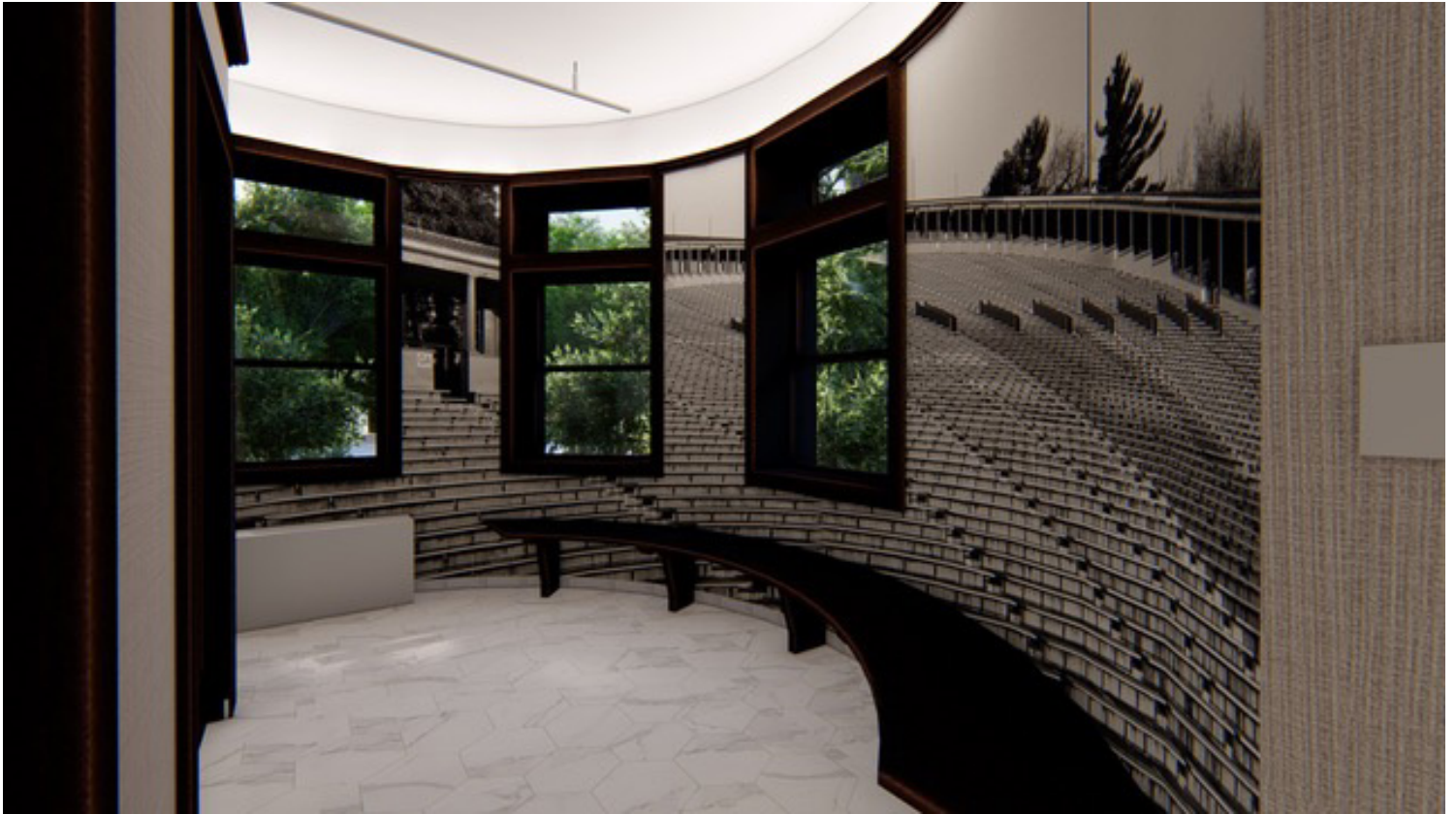

View from entry, showing turret windows, mural, and bench.

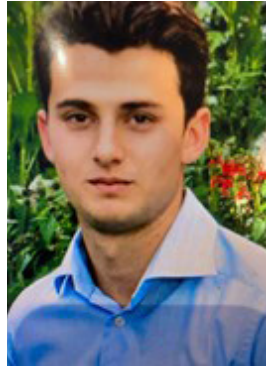


View from entry, showing sinks and stalls.

New Member Intros



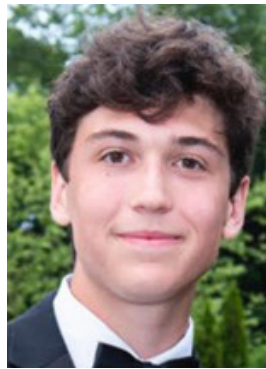

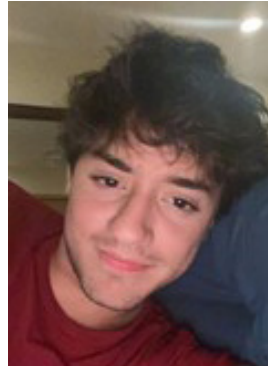
